50 THINGS YOU CAN DO TO HELP SOMEONE GET READY FOR A SUCCESSFUL ADULTHOOD

- 1. Help them get an original copy of their birth certificate.
- 2. Line them up with a good counselor.
- 3. Buy them an alarm clock and teach them how to use it.
- 4. Teach them how to cook five good meals.
- 5. Role play contacts with police, bank tellers, doctors and others.
- 6. Teach them how to do their taxes.
- 7. Enroll them in a school program in which they can succeed.
- 8. Teach them how to store food.
- 9. Line them up with a dentist they can continue to use.
- 10. Help them find a better paying job.
- 11. Find out if they are eligible for a Medicaid card.
- 12. Help them get copies of medical records.
- 13. Help them understand a lease or rental agreement.
- 14. Connect them with a church group.
- 15. Teach them how to use the bus system and read the bus schedule.
- 16. Help them get a picture identification card.
- 17. Help them renew contact with family members.
- 18. Help them develop at least one friendship.
- 19. Start a "Life Book" that will contain important papers.
- 20. Take them to join a local recreation center.
- 21. Take them to a session of adult court, traffic and criminal.
- 22. Teach them how to write and cash a check.
- 23. Show them the best place to shop for food, clothing and furniture.
- 24. Help them learn how to look up resources in their community.
- 25. Teach them how to use an oven and microwave.

26. Tell them how to get a lawyer and when to get one.

- 27. Help them get a social security card.
- 28. Help them develop good phone communication skills.
- 29. Teach them how to read a map.
- 30. Talk to them about their feelings about going out on their own.
- 31. Go over tenant and landlord rights.
- 32. Teach them how to thoroughly clean a kitchen and bathroom.
- 33. Make a list of important phone numbers.
- 34. Show them how to use the library and get a library card.
- 35. Take them on a tour of the city.
- 36. Line them up with a doctor they can use when they are on their own.
- 37. Teach them how to read a paycheck stub.
- 38. Help them find and get along with a potential roommate.
- 39. Help them get copies of medical records.
- 40. Help them develop their Plan for My Future.
- 41. Role play several different styles of job interviews.
- 42. Help them put together a resume and an application fact sheet.
- 43. Teach them how to use coupons and comparison shop.
- 44. Make sure they really understand birth control.
- 45. Help them find a safe, inexpensive place to live.
- 46. Teach them some new ways how to have fun.
- 47. Teach them how to budget their money.
- 48. Help them get a driver's license and price insurance.
- 49. Teach them how to write a letter and mail it.
- 50. Help them put together a family scrapbook.
